

Ostensibly, this book is a collection of letters from Abbott to author Norman Mailer. It is far more than that. Abbott, in his letters displays not only an intelligence that refused to be suffocated by prison, but, more unique, compelling thought and insight into the workings of this society that travels under the psuedonymn "democracy."

Abbott is self-taught in everything he examines. The product of foster homes, juvenile penal institutions and prisons: Abbott had. until he recieved a parole last summer, spent a total of nine and one half months out from behind bars, since the age of twelve. During the five years spent in Maximum Security, Abbott read with the intensity of a man whose sight had just been restored. Hegel, Whitehead, Russel, Marx, Lenin, Kierkegaard, Sartre....when Abbott speaks of Mao Tsetung or Albert Camus, he knows what he is talking about.

His book is an edited version of what it is like to correspond on every topic relevent to freedom; liberation of the body, but especially liberation of the mind and soul. We are presented with views on solitary confinement, racism in and out of prison, the legal system, "Gods and Drugs", foreign affairs and Marxism

"When Dosoevsky pointed out that we are not generalized men, abstract men, the "Ideal" man, he did not mean to imply the opposite; that we are all ignoble, sensuous, weak, full of shit, etc. He meant all of us ... are all capable of dying for a just cause, a "beautiful idea", a principle. In short, we are all capable of honor, not just the "noble classes."

"He meant that the human heart is by no means a human weakness. Quite the contrary. Nothing that touches the human heart is absurd, because the Absurd is at bottom a contradiction and the heart chooses sides, defends a term, if you will, to the exclusion of others. A insoluable contradiction ia paradox. A paradox titilates the human heart, does not burden it with dispair of absurd, meaningless existence. Half the pro-

When In the Belly of the Beast appeared last year, it was met by some praise in literary quarters, but there was certainly no big fanfare in the press or the rest of the media. It was probably a case where the powers that be prefered to render it harmless with silence. That did not work, as the book found its way onto best seller lists.

It wasn't until July, when Abbott was involved in a stabbing outside a New York allnight resturant that the media turned its attention, not so much on the book, but the man who wrote it, and we began to hear stories about Jack Abbott, a "deranged Man", a "killer", an unreformable ghoul who had spent his life in prison. Abbott was finally adressed in the press, in much the same way a lynch mob eulogizes its intended victim.

Now, Abbott has been found guilty of stabbing a man in New York last July, and still the details of the incident are confused and presented by the media in the same way demagogues always present their case; relying on the ignorance of their audience. Perhaps it is common in New York to refuse people the use of a washroom in a public resturant,

perhaps the witer did tell Abbott to use the alley, perhaps the facts were never very important in this trial.

It might be enlightening to read the transcripts of the trial, to see the evidence and hear the statements, but that in itself would still not provide enough information for understanding what happened last summer or what has happened since. Jack Abbott was convicted on the evening news months ago.

Why have they gone after Abbott they way they have? While the act of stabbing someone is certainly serious, it is also almost certainly never placed front and center, night after night, news report after report.

Was it necessary to "take care" of Abbott because of what his book is about? Because of the interest and support he was getting from writers and others nationally? Yes.

In The Belly of The Beast is not just an account of prison life, it is a screaming condemnation of the society that maintains prisons, just as it maintains dictators in Latin America, air bases in the Phillipines, or napalm attacks on Lebanon. In the Belly of the Beast presents in the most vivid way the connections, mainly hidden from the "mainstream" on the "outside", that are revealed daily, in a concentrated way, on the "inside."

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"Free will; this is the doctrine of the American judiciary when it insists prisoners are to blame for whatever harm is inflicted upon them by prisons ...

"In San Quentin, and many other prisons, if a guard on a gun-rail or in a gun tower sees you touch another prisoner, he will shoot you down with his rifle. If he sees you run in the exercise yard, he will shoot you down with his rifle. In the process, stray" bullets always strike down other prisoners.

"If the guards come to your cell to search it and before they can enter your cell you make a move toward your toilet, you will be shot down in your cell. They are afraid you will flush contraband down the

serves to be subjected to all this as a matter of justice?"


Abbott examines the conditions in US prisons well beyond the surface phenomenon, into the ideological and political reasons and connections that determine every aspect of "normal life" in this "best of all possible worlds".

No one who reads this book cab escape the question of why society exists as it does or what should be done about it.

This, at bottom, is why Jack Abbott was tried and convicted before he set foot in the courthouse. This is why the picture was presented of Abbott the "killer", the "psycho", the convict. Those who stood by Abbott haven't escaped this wrath of the ruling class either. There has been no end

of slanders and attacks on Norman Mailer in the press and on TV. The message here is clear enough, "writers, know your place!"

Ironicly, Abbott posed a question in one of his letters to Mailer; What if they treated you, as a supposedly "free" person, in the manner the authorities treat a prisoner?

Indeed. What if they beat a man to death, on the subway in Chicago, for smoking a cigarette? What if Nazis and Klansmen murdered five people in public and on national television, and were then aguited, as happened in Greensboro, N.C. in 1980? What is government troops trained governments in El Salvador and Guatamala in the latest torture methods or "search and destroy" method of eliminating peasant opposition?

Jack Henry Abbott has never maintained he would be able to fit into the mainstream of this society. There are hundreds of years of reasons why his attitude, far from being "psychotic", is this way. In his book, he points out, "Yogis starve their needs to death. I feed mine dreams.

And the truth is, dreams of freedom, and the danger of being lynched, have long accompanied each other in the belly of the beast.


SAIC Security Notes:

Video Data Bank notes:

The following guidelines were developed to establish "Fair Use" of videotapes (off the air recordings of TV broadcasts) by educational institutions under the Federal Copyright Act.

1) Off-air recordings may be kept for 45 days; after that, they must be erased or destroyed.

2) A recording may be used once by individual teachers while teaching and may be repeated only once during the first ten days after taping.

3) After the first ten days, recordings may be used only for teacher evaluation purposes and not for teaching. 4) Recordings may be made only at the request of and used by individual teachers and may not regularly be recorded in anti-

cipation of requests. These guidelines apply to all off-the-air recordings unless special licenses are obtained from the copyright holders. Until such licenses are obtained, the Video Date Bank will not record any TV Broadcasts for inclusion in the Data Bank tape collection.
